Note from Marilyn

In this festive month, we remember three important saints: Nicholas, Ambrose, and Lucia. Let's take a look at these interesting saints.

December 6, Nicholas, Bishop of Myra

The best-known of the three, Nicholas' good deeds and charity to the poor are the inspiration for our modern day Santa Claus. He is celebrated mostly in central Europe. On his feast day, he makes his appearance in towns and villages, dressed as a bishop and riding a horse. He spends the time between December 6 and 25 traveling the country, distributing gifts and treats. Children in the Netherlands (where he is known as Sinterklaas) leave their shoes by the door to be filled with small gifts. Nicholas is the patron saint of children and sailors.

December 7, <u>Ambrose</u> of Milan

Ambrose was born around 340 AD to a Christian family. He was educated in Rome where he studied law and literature. He became the governor of Milan in 374 AD. When the Bishop of Milan died, there was controversy over who would succeed him. Ambrose stepped in as a peacemaker and did such a good job, that the people demanded that he should be the next bishop. He was still a catechumen and not baptized, but the church council wanted hm so badly that he was baptized, confirmed, and consecrated on the same day. Ambrose believed that the people should be able to participate in the liturgy, and he reorganized the services to make this possible. He is responsible for antiphonal chant, in which the congregation repeats a phrase sung by the choir, and he wrote many hymns. A popular legend about Ambrose is that when he was an infant a swarm of bees landed on his face. They did not sting, but left a drop of honey on his lips. As a preacher, he was known as "the honey-tongued orator." He is the patron saint of beekeepers.

December 13, Lucia

Lucia was born to a wealthy family in the early part of the fourth century. At that time, Christians were persecuted and many went into hiding. Lucia, also a Christian, took food to them under cover of darkness. She devised a halo of candles worn on her head so her hands were free to carry more food. Lucia was martyred for her faith; her death was rather graphic, so I won't go into that. Lucia is celebrated in the Scandinavian countries where she is known as the "bringer of light." On December 13, Lucia processions of young girls dressed in white robes and carrying candles visit schools, workplaces and nursing homes, bringing treats and singing traditional songs. Only "Lucia" wears the wreath of candles. Lucia is one of the few saints celebrated by the Lutheran church. I have a Lucia ornament on my tree. She is the patron saint of the blind.

"The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." John 1:5 May you have a blessed and peaceful Christmas season, *Marilyn*

2<u>Long Term Supply Priest Proposal</u>: Pastor Bill presented to the vestry members via e-mail during the vestry meeting his proposal as long-term supply priest. After a lengthy discussion, Matt made a motion to accept Pastor Bill's proposal; Keith seconded. Jim asked to table the motion for time to review the proposal. All vestry members agreed to table this motion until next week.

③<u>Banner</u>: Pastor Bill and Nancy saw a sign next door at the Christian Church regarding their zoom services. Bill did research to have banner made for Trinity reflective of our services and the cost would be around \$35.00. Motion was made by Jim to have a banner made for Trinity and hang on our front doors; second by Susan; motion passed. Pastor Bill has a sign ready for our prayer garden.

• <u>Ash Wednesday Service</u>: Jim asked whose turn will it be in 2021 to hold the Ash Wednesday Service. We rotate with Emmanuel Lutheran, First Presbyterian, and Schoenbrunn Moravian. It will be our turn to host. Ash Wednesday falls on February 17, 2021. Jack volunteered to contact the churches to see how they feel about the service while we are still in the midst of pandemic.

•<u>Thank You</u>: Jim thanked Kathy for the Christmas decorating.

• <u>Postponing Organ Tuning</u>: There was discussion regarding the postponement of the organ tuning until next spring when we will, hopefully, be back inside the church building.

● <u>Parish</u>: Jim wants to be sure we keep in touch with parish and it should not fall on just one or two people. We all need to be involved in checking on our

congregation. Jack volunteered to draft a parish letter.

<u>Music/Copyright</u>: With music being printed in the bulletins and zooming, Marilyn has received a "special offer" from Christian Copyright Licensing International for one year to have rights to video and print music. Discussion. Motion made by Matt to purchase streaming license for \$116.10; second by Susan; Jim and Keith voted no; tie breaker was Jack and he voted to purchase the license; motion passed.
<u>Vestry Members for 2021</u>: In January, Jack will have served two – three year terms as vestry member and will need to step off vestry. Jim made a proposal to keep Jack on vestry during the pandemic. Vestry agreed.

②<u>Annual Meeting</u>: Annual meeting will take place the fourth Sunday in January (17th) and this year it may have to be a zoom meeting.

Christmas Star...to light up the December sky. On December 21, we can witness something not seen in nearly 800 During the upcoming winter vears. solstice, Jupiter and Saturn will line up to create what is known as the "Christmas Star" or "Star of Bethlehem." These two planets have not appeared this close together from Earth's vantage point since the Middle Ages. Alignments between these two planets are rather rare occurring once every 20 years but this conjunction is exceptionally rare because of how close the planets will appear to be to one Stargazers should turn their another.
